Know your rights: Breastfeeding Law

Breastfeeding services: Under the affordable Care Act, new plans are required to cover breastfeeding support, supplies and counseling

In the community: It's unlawful for someone to request that you stop feeding your baby, cover your child, move to a different area, or leave while you are feeding your baby. (RCW 49.60.030 & 49.60.215)

At work: Federal law states that employers with \geq 50 employees, shall provide breastfeeding employees with "reasonable break time" and a private, non-bathroom place free from intrusion to express breast milk during the workday, up until the child's first birthday.
